On behalf of the cast and crew of Welcome Yule!, I extend a warm welcome to our celebration. We've prepared an exciting program with several new pieces arranged by Assistant Music Director and Orchestra Leader Thomas W. Hutcheson. As always, there is a blend of jovial wassails, glorious carols, and of course, the Yule Log Procession, when each of you is invited to touch the Yule log with your holly and make a wish for the new year.

This year we draw from the ancient well of Norse Mythology. The stories of The Norse Creation, the Death of Baldur, and Ragnarok, the Twilight of the Gods vividly portray the universal cycle of creation, destruction and regeneration. The Making of Thor's Hammer brings out a light moment in the saga of the gods while the Mummers' Play, artfully penned by Jim Ellis, delightfully spoofs Wagner's Ring Cycle.

Two of the Norse stories have been paired with songs from the Sacred Harp tradition. The anguish experienced by the Death of Baldur is amplified by the apprehension of the World Unknown. Likewise, the promise of a new and better world to come as expressed in Ragnarok is joyously echoed in the fervent refrains of New Jerusalem.

Combining Norse story with British and American traditional music has been gratifying work. I hope you enjoy the blend. And whether you're a newcomer to our festivities, or a returning celebrant, our message remains:
