A Note from the Producers



There are things that become such an integral part of our experience that it's hard to imagine life without them. Welcome Yule has become one of those things in our lives. Each fall as the days shorten and the frost starts to go deeper in the ground, we find ourselves preparing a show to celebrate the return of the light. It's not quite deepest winter yet but it's a time to get a good running start to carry us through the Christmas season and the coldest, darkest part of the winter still to come.
